4. Penga Teng Tso Lake

- Another pristine glacial lake, en route to Bumla Pass.
- Ideal for meditation, photography, and scenic relaxation.

5. Nuranang Falls (Jang Waterfalls)

- A 100-meter high waterfall, one of Arunachal Pradesh's most spectacular cascades.
- Popular for photography, short trekking, and riverside picnics.

6. Sangti Valley

- Known as the Valley of Peace, it features lush meadows, flowing rivers, and Monpa villages.
- Famous for bird watching, camping, and offbeat trekking experiences.

7. Tawang War Memorial

- A tribute to Indian soldiers who fought in the 1962 Indo-China War.
- Offers panoramic views of Tawang town and the surrounding valleys.

Best Time to Visit Tawang

Season	Experience
Spring (March – May)	Pleasant weather, blooming flowers, and clear views of mountains.
Summer (June – August)	Green valleys, flowing rivers, occasional rains, and snowmelt streams.
Autumn (September – November)	Crisp air, clear skies, ideal for trekking, sightseeing, and photography.
Winter (December – February)	It is cold and snowy, offering stunning snow-covered landscapes. Road accessibility may be limited.

How to Reach Tawang

- **By Road:** Well-connected via Guwahati ? Tezpur ? Bomdila ? Tawang highway. Shared taxis and private vehicles are standard.
- **By Air:** Tezpur Airport (Assam) is the nearest airport, about 330 km from Tawang. From there, hire a taxi or join a guided tour.
- **By Train:** The nearest railway station is Rangapara North (Assam), 310 km from Tawang.

Pro Tip: Tawang is a restricted area, and all travellers need to obtain an Inner Line Permit (ILP) in advance, available from Guwahati, Tezpur, or Tawang town.

Day 1: Guwahati → Dirang | Dist: 256km | Time: 07–08 hrs

- Meet our trip representative at the designated pickup point in Guwahati.

Day 2: Bomdila/Dirang → Tawang | Dist: 169km | Time: 04–05 hrs

- After breakfast, head towards Tawang.
- En route, you will cross Sela Pass, a mountain pass that remains snow-covered in winter.
- Also, stop at Sela Lake, a scenic spot ideal for photography.
- Pay homage at the Jaswant Garh War Memorial, built in honour of the brave soldier Jaswant Singh Rawat.
- Continue the drive to Tawang, enjoying the scenic mountain views along the route.

Day 3: Tawang Sightseeing

- After breakfast, you will go sightseeing in Tawang.

- Explore the Sixth Dalai Lama Gompa, a vital monastery marking the birthplace of the Sixth Dalai Lama.

- Continue the drive through the mountains and valleys until you reach Sangti.
- On reaching Sangti, check into your hotel and unwind for the evening.

A: The Tawang trip involves long drives and high-altitude travel, which can be tiring for elderly people. However, if they are physically fit and have no severe medical issues, they can enjoy the Tawang tour comfortably with proper precautions.

Q: What is the cost of a Tawang tour package?

A: The average Tawang tour package cost ranges from ₹18,000 to ₹22,000 per person, depending on the group size, hotel category, and whether Bumla Pass is included.

Q: Is oxygen required for the Tawang trip?

A: Generally, oxygen support is not required for a Tawang trip. Still, if you have breathing issues or heart conditions, it's advisable to consult a doctor and carry a portable oxygen source as a precaution.

Q: Can I do a bike trip to Tawang?

Q: Can foreigners visit Tawang?

A: Yes, but foreigners need a Protected Area Permit (PAP) instead of an Inner Line Permit. The Tawang trip for foreign tourists requires prior approval from the government.
